

KEYNOTE ADDRESS

John Balbus, MD
Acting Director
HHS Office of Climate Change
and Health Equity
Washington, DC

Dr. Balbus is the Acting Director of the new Office of Climate Change and Health Equity within OASH. A physician and public health professional with over 25 years of experience working on the health implications of climate change, Dr. Balbus has served as HHS Principal to the U.S. Global Change Research Program and co-chair of the working group on Climate Change and Human Health for the U.S. Global Change Research Program since he joined the federal government in 2009. Before coming over to the new Office, Dr. Balbus served as Senior Advisor for Public Health to the Director of the National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences.

Prior to joining NIEHS, Dr. Balbus was the Chief Health Scientist at the Environmental Defense Fund and an Associate Professor of Environmental and Occupational Health at the George Washington School of Public Health and Health Services. He received his MPH degree from the Johns Hopkins School of Hygiene and Public Health, his MD degree from the University of Pennsylvania, and his undergraduate degree in Biochemistry from Harvard University. He was elected to the National Academy of Medicine in 2021.

Climate Change and Health Equity: The Roles of the Health Care Sector | 11:10 AM - 12:00 PM | Lancaster/Gettysburg Ballroom

Widespread health care system experiences around the United States over the past two years have starkly illustrated the interconnections between pandemic preparedness, health threats from extreme weather and climate-related disasters, and health equity. Protecting the health of everyone in the United States and its territories requires not only enhancing resilience and reducing health disparities of communities, especially those most disadvantaged, but also enhancing the sustainability and resilience of health care delivery systems themselves. The HHS Office of Climate Change and Health Equity (OCCHE) is working across the federal government to develop and enhance activities in all these areas. This presentation will highlight the connections between climate change and health equity, describe how the healthcare sector is mobilizing to address both the health threats associated with climate change and the urgent need to reduce its own greenhouse gas emissions, and share highlights of OCCHE's achievements over its one year of existence.

During this session, we will explore the importance and effectiveness of health literacy communication skills in improving the patient and clinician experience. We will share an innovative curriculum aimed at physicians who care for inpatients at the bedside, which has been proven to improve communication-specific patient satisfaction scores. We will

review health literacy principles and video demonstrations of “bad” and “good” provider-patient discussions, to give attendees the opportunity to identify and discuss evidence-based communication skills. We will review how these skills can also be used during outpatient encounters. Participants will have the opportunity to practice these communication techniques in small groups, using realistic cases from the inpatient and outpatient settings.

By generating a rich discussion that includes facilitators and barriers to clear communication, participants will leave our session with several deliverables including specific words and phrases to add to their “tool-box” for their own communication with patients, and to use in their teaching of residents, nurses and APPs on how to improve their communication.





Dr. Bonnel completed his Internal Medicine (IM) residency at the Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania in 2018 and was the first IM graduate to pursue the Penn Ultrasound Fellowship directly from residency. During his fellowship, his focus was on using handheld ultrasound on home visits and developing the HOUSE protocol published in the American Journal of Geriatrics. During POCUS fellowship, Dr. Bonnel gained experience teaching ultrasound both at home and abroad and continues to do so. He has served as an expert trainer in POCUS courses in the United States, Bangladesh, Uganda, and Yemen through collaborations with the non-governmental organizations MedGlobal and Pious Projects. Dr. Bonnel also volunteers as an attending physician at Puentes de Salud, a charity clinic for undocumented Latinx migrants in Philadelphia. Ultrasound is fundamental to Dr. Bonnel’s daily practice in hospital medicine, and he has been appointed as a core faculty member of the IM residency program at PAH for his role in building the ultrasound curriculum.



Dr. Rosenbach is the co-director of the inpatient consult service, and serves a variety of educational roles including Vice Chair of Education and program director of the dermatology residency. Dr. Rosenbach's clinical practice is focused on complex medical dermatology, where he runs a sarcoidosis clinic, and sees inpatients and outpatients with hematologic malignancies and cutaneous complications, autoimmune skin conditions, or patients with undiagnosed diseases; his research is focused primarily on sarcoidosis and granulomatous skin conditions. He has published more than 230 peer reviewed articles, multiple chapters, and six textbooks, including serving as one of the editors of Andrew's Diseases of the Skin. He has been recognized for clinical expertise with multiple Philadelphia & regional 'Top Docs' titles, and is in Penn's Academy of Master Clinicians. He has won numerous teaching awards, including the medical students' teaching award in dermatology, the dermatology resident's teaching award, and the prestigious Lindback Award, which is the University of Pennsylvania's Provost Teaching Award – the highest teaching award at Penn.
